2. All entries for floats should be made to the Fair Board Office by 3 p.m. on Friday, August 1st or will not be considered for judging.
3. It is suggested that floats follow the parade theme.
4. The float theme is to be displayed on both sides of the float with the name of the group or organization displayed on the back of the float.
5. Basis for judging floats is a standard of points: Adherence to theme--10 pts., Originality--10 pts., Color--10 pts., Spectator interest--10 pts., Construction--10 pts., TOTAL 50 pts.
6. **No motorized vehicles driven by a minor unless accompanied by an adult.**
7. Streets leading onto Main Street will be blocked.
8. All children walking or riding bicycles/wagons in the parade should be picked up by a parent or guardian at Skyland Grain. All other entries should continue to Fair Grounds.
9. All Vehicles will be respectful to other participants and spectators. No Horseplay will be tolerated. Law Enforcement will escort violators from parade.
10. The parade line up is as follows:
 - a. Bowling Alley -Police escort, Color Guard, children, pets, golf carts
 - b. Swimming Pool – motorized vehicles except golf carts
 - c. Airport - fire trucks, floats, horses, miscellaneous. (Horses will be last in parade)

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE HAMILTON COUNTY FAIR

The Hamilton County Fair Board & Extension Agent, in cooperation with the Adult Superintendent(s) of the specific area, reserve the right to interpret all rules & regulations and to arbitrarily settle all questions arising in connection with the Fair:

1. Advance entries are encouraged for all 4-H entrees. *The Extension Office requires Fashion Revue entries one week in advance.* It is suggested to have all entries to fair office by Thursday, July 24th.
2. Advanced entries for Open Class are encouraged by Thursday, July 24th. If entry form is received by the Fair Office in advance, the cards will be typed. Entry forms are available at the back of this fair book, at the fair office, or online at www.hamiltoncountyfairgrounds.com. You may send, email, call in or drop off your entry form.

There is a mailbox on location, you may drop your forms in as well.

3. An official entry card must be filled out for each exhibit. If you do not pre-enter, you must hand write your cards out, the morning of entry. Please allow extra time to do this. Entries will close at 10:00AM. If you are unable to enter at the specified time, you may drop your entries off at the fair office in advance.
4. Exhibits are to be the handiwork of the exhibitor where mechanical or hand skill is required; or the grower where crops or garden exhibits are entered; or the owner and feeder where livestock exhibits are entered and must not have been entered in a previous fair.
5. A judge may withhold any or all premiums if the articles or animals are not worthy of an award.
6. Any person interfering with the judging or who publicly voices disapproval of the judge's decision will forfeit any awards won.
7. Decisions of judges shall be final, subject only to written protest which will be acted upon by the Fair Board. A protest must be made in writing to the secretary, setting forth the grounds for the protest. Such protest must be filed by 1:00 PM the last day of the fair.
8. Management is not responsible for accidents, fire or theft of exhibits, nor injuries to persons or animals. Exhibits shall be displayed at the owner's risk.
9. Exhibitors must claim their property at the close of the Fair. All exhibits except livestock must remain in place until 11:00 AM, Saturday, August 2nd. If you are unable to pick up your exhibit(s), please make arrangements with the fair office.
10. Livestock will be released at the announced time the

evening of Friday, August 1st. If livestock is to be left later than Thursday evening, exhibitor must make arrangements with the superintendent ahead of time. (This rule does not include livestock going to the sale.) Animals sold at the 4-H Sale may be removed by the buyer prior to release time, but the superintendent must be notified. If exhibits or animals are removed prior to official release time, the exhibitor forfeits all premiums. Any exhibit left beyond released time is left without supervision. Fair Board will assign pens or stalls or place entries in office.

11. Animals must be sound and healthy to be shown or sold, with the decision at the discretion of a veterinarian.
12. Any exhibitor who neglects or refuses to keep his or her entry or pen clean for the duration of the fair shall forfeit his or her prize money and remove his or her animal from the Fairgrounds immediately. Decisions will be made by a committee comprised of the chair persons of the 4-H Council, 4-H P.D.C. and Fair Board.
13. All exhibitors must be responsible for feeding, grooming, and cleaning of livestock & facilities.
14. Exhibitors shall abide by state livestock requirements - available at Fair Office & Extension Office.
15. Premiums are to be picked up and signed for in the Fair Office from 11:00 AM - Noon, Saturday, August 2nd. *Premiums left over 60 days will be considered void.*
16. Youth who participate in the Auction must write and present thank you notes to either the Hamilton County Fair office or Extension office before receiving sale money. This must be completed by September 1st or sale money will be forfeited.
17. Set up and clean-up is mandatory for all Youth Sale & 4-H members or sale and premium money will be forfeited. Special circumstances will be considered by the Fair Board on a case by case basis.

18. All entries should be clean and in best possible condition.
19. Premiums will be as follows: Livestock - Blue \$5, Red \$3, and White \$2. Other - Blue \$3, Red \$2, and White \$1. Premiums are given as follows: 4-H, Scouts, and Open Class Youth are all given a premium and ribbon. Open Class Adults are given one 1st, 2nd, and 3rd in each class. If you received a ribbon sticker on your entry a physical ribbon may be picked up at the Fair Office. Premium money will be limited to \$150.00 (not including special prizes) per person with unlimited number of entries.
20. In the event available funds are inadequate to pay full premiums, the management reserves the right to prorate the premium money.
21. Exhibits are limited to residents of Hamilton County, Kansas, or members of Hamilton County organized clubs. With the Exception of out of town guests, who may enter three exhibits. Please contact the fair office for more information.
22. **THERE IS NO LIMIT TO ENTRIES AN EXHIBITOR MAY ENTER.** If there are 5 or more of the same item, they will be judged as a separate class and will be given a 1st, 2nd & 3rd placing and then judged overall with all in Department.
Age Divisions: 4-H (green card)
 Scouts (buff card)
 Youth: Ages 0-18 (lavendar card)
 Adult 19+ (white card)
 Seniors 65+ (yellow card)

LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

1. All livestock must be inspected by the grounds veterinarian prior to being allowed to unload onto the fairgrounds.
2. Exhibitors shall abide by state livestock requirements - available at Fair Office & Extension Office.
3. All animals, deemed questionable by reasonable cause, must be accompanied by an official health certificate issued within 30 days of exhibit and must be available

upon request.

4. All animals need to be identified by tattoo or ear tag and all market livestock must have been weighed at the preliminary weigh-ins. Animals can only show in one class, which must be determined at fair weigh in time. You can't show the same animal in both breeding and market.
5. Animals with active lesions, multiple warts or mange will not be allowed to exhibit.
6. All tests must have been by a state appointed lab.
7. Use of Tranquilizers will not be permitted. Results will be immediate disqualification.
8. Withdrawl times for drugs and medications must follow labels to assure a safe wholesome food supply. Any medications given, oral or injected, on the fairgrounds must be approved by the majority of the Fair board. There will be no off label usage of any drug or medication allowed on the fairgrounds without the approval of the assigned veterinarian for the Hamilton County Fair. Only medications labeled for animal usage may be used. All medications must be approved by the grounds veterinarian and administered in the presence of two fair board members or the veterinarian. The only exception is in the case of life threatening emergencies. If emergency medication or drugs are given, it must be reported to the fair board immediately after being administered.

CATTLE

All animals, except steers, must meet Health Certificate requirements as outlined in the following rules (1) through (5).

BRUCELLOSIS REQUIREMENTS:

All cattle admitted to the Fairgrounds must meet one of the following requirements:

1. Originate in and constitute a part of a certified BRUCELLOSIS free herd. Herd certification number must be entered on the health certificate.
2. Originate from a USDA BRUCELLOSIS free classified state. No test required.
3. Official calfhood vaccinated animals of beef breeds under

24 months of age and dairy breeds under 20 months of age may show without a BRUCELLOSIS test. Vaccination tattoo symbol must appear in health certificate.

4. For Dairy Cattle, refer to Livestock Health Requirements in the Kansas State Fair Livestock Premium Book.
5. Cattle not qualifying under 1, 2, and 3 or 4, must present health certificate of negative blood test of BRUCELLOSIS in an approved state-federal laboratory in all animals over 6 months of age within 30 days of the show date.
6. Out of state cattle must comply with uniform methods and rules, interstate movement requirements, according to classification of their state. Test eligible age is six months.

TUBERCULOSIS REQUIREMENT

1. Health certificate that animal originated in and is part of a TB accredited herd. Must give accredited herd number.
2. Originate from a USDA classified "TB free" state. (Kansas is a TB free state).
3. Cattle not qualifying under 1 and 2 must be tested negative for TB within 90 days of the show, except steers and calves under six months of age.

SHEEP & GOATS

Upon request, all sheep must be accompanied by an official health certificate. Sheep must be free of any signs of sore mouth, any active fungal (ringworm) infection, including club lamb fungus, mange, or warts. All must be identified with an official USDA premise ID tag.

SWINE

Upon request, all swine must be accompanied by an official health certificate. Negative Psuedorabies & Brucellosis test are not required for Kansas origin swine. Out of state swine must meet the following requirements: Originate from Psuedorabies\ Brucellosis free herd with current health certificate that swine have tested negative for Psuedorabies by serum neutralization & Brucellosis within 30 days prior to entry and that the herd of origin has had no positive cases of Pseudorabies in past 12

months. Swine vaccinated for Pseudorabies shall not be allowed into Kansas for exhibition or any other purposes.

HORSES

All horses must have been vaccinated for equine encephalitis and must have written proof from a Vet or must have been done in the presence of the County Extension Agent or Horse Leader by June 1. A negative Coggins test for equine infectious anemia within 12 months is advised, but not required for Kansas horses. Horses originating from other states shall show evidence of a negative EIA-Coggins test conducted by a state approved laboratory within 12 months prior to entry into Kansas. Foals, six months or younger, accompanying their negative testing dams, are exempt from EIA requirements. A valid "Horse Passport" may be used in lieu of a health certificate. If a passport is used, a negative EIA test within 6 months is required.

POULTRY

All poultry, except waterfowl, must show proof that they are pullorum-typhoid clean by one of the following methods:

1. Originate from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flock as evidenced by an official VS Form 9-3 certifying all birds in the flock over 4 months of age have had negative test for pullorum-typhoid within the past year.
2. Present evidence that the entries were purchased from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean source and have been either the only poultry on the premises of the owner or have been physically separated from other flocks.
3. Present an official VS Form 9-2 signed by an official testing agent showing that the entries have had a negative result from pullorum typhoid test conducted w/in 90 days prior to the Fair. No testing will be done at the fair.

DOGS

Written proof of up-to-date rabies vaccination, signed by a licensed accredited veterinarian must be presented to the superintendent before the show to be eligible to compete. DHL and current parvo virus (within 60 days with killed and 5 months with modified) vaccination is strongly recommended.

CATS

Proof of up-to-date rabies vaccination (vaccination certificate or health certificate) is recommended but not mandatory. Feline leukemia vaccination is strongly recommended.

SHOWMANSHIP RULES

The Fair Board will award Belt Buckles to the Grand and Reserve Champion in Round Robin for each age division in 4-H.

1. 4-H Showmanship will be divided into Junior, Intermediate and Senior classes in each species. The Champion and Reserve Junior, Intermediate and Senior (AS-Qualified) from each species (beef, sheep, swine, dairy, goat and horse) will advance to the Round Robin. Youth must show in their own age division with no option to change divisions. Youth must show their own animals.
2. In the event that one individual is awarded Champion or Reserve in more than one division, that person has the option to choose the species of choice and the third place individual will be brought in to compete. This will continue until the space is filled, in the blue ribbon winners only.
3. Senior division will show first in the species divisions, as well as, the Round Robin drive.

4-H RULES

- A. General rules and regulations apply to the 4-H and Youth Divisions.
- B. Only 4-H members may show in this division and they must be enrolled in the project to be eligible to exhibit in that department.
- C. 4-H members should show their own entries; however, in case of illness or additional entries in that class, assistance from another 4-H member is permitted.
- D. A Grand or Reserve Champion ribbon does not automatically qualify that entry to go to State Fair.
- E. Departments will be split into Junior (7-9), Intermediate

(10-13) and Senior (14 and over) divisions, 4-H age.

- F. All animal exhibits must have been in the care of the 4-H member before May 15 of current year.
- L. Fair set up and clean up is mandatory for all 4-H members or sale and premium money will be forfeited. Special circumstances will be considered by the Fair Board on an individual case.

YOUTH EXHIBIT SALE

All Hamilton County Youth who entered an exhibit in the fair are allowed to participate. You do not have to be in 4-H to sell an item. Non-livestock sale items must have received blue or purple ribbon placings and livestock may have purple, blue, red or white ribbon placings to be sold. Youth livestock exhibitors may sell two animals but they must be of different species. Livestock sale order will be rotated every year.

Youth are responsible for:

1. Youth must sign up their own sale item in the Fair Office **BEFORE NOON** on Friday, August 1st.
2. Exhibitor must present their own product to be sold.
3. All livestock must meet the requirements of their market species in order to sell.
4. Caring for livestock until released.
5. Checking with the buyer to arrange transfer.
6. Once you have put the animal on the floor you can not take it off during or after the auction.
7. Announcing the intent to buy back the animal at floor price, before the sale.
8. Declaring "No Sale" at the end of bidding, if desired.
9. Checks will be issued 3 weeks after the sale to allow all buyer's checks & invoices to clear. All sellers must help set up for fair and tear down to receive a premium check.
10. Youth must write and present thank you notes to the Fair or Ext. office. This must be completed by September 1st or sale money will be forfeited.

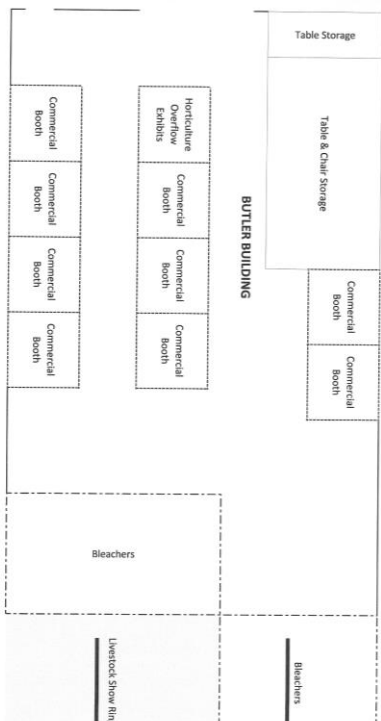

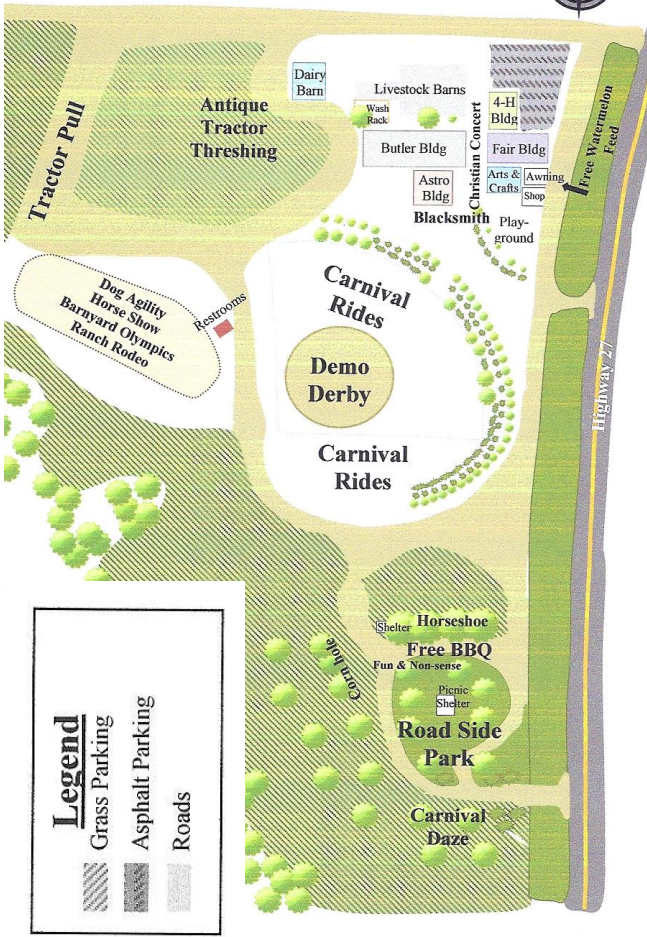
RULES AND REGULATIONS

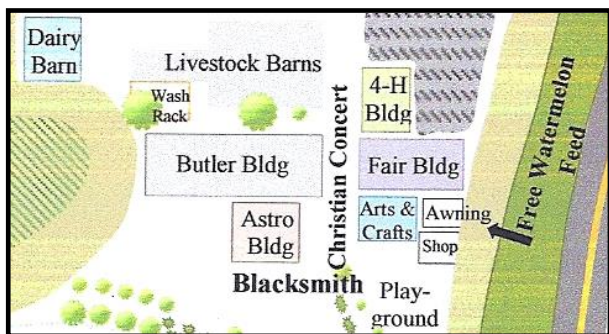
1. The display space will be issued based on vendor needs. Donations are accepted but there will be a \$6.00/day charge if you use electricity.

The registration form is due by July 18, 2014 to allow time to arrange spaces.
2. Applications for space may be made through the Fair Office, 620-384-5433, P.O. Box 1024 / 806 S. Main St., Syracuse, KS 67878, fairbrd@pld.com, or online at www.hamiltoncountyfairgrounds.com.
3. Exhibitors must furnish their own extension cords, surge protectors, etc.
4. The exhibitor must provide own supervision. Building is opened at 7AM and will be locked at 9 PM.
5. Nothing is to be displayed or sold that might be considered offensive for small children.
6. Respect other exhibitors and fair activities in progress, regarding sound level and display.
7. Exhibits must be removed from area by 10:30 AM on Saturday, August 2, 2014.
8. Failure to adhere to rules will be considered in future approval of entry.
9. Commercial displays may also be set up at events if exhibitor provides own tent or trailer. Contact Fair Office for more info.
